HYMNS OF THE DAY

Tone 5 - Resurrectional Troparion

Let <u>us</u>, the faithful, praise and <u>wor</u>ship the Word, co-eternal with the Father and the <u>Spirit</u>, <u>born</u> for our salvation from the <u>Virgin</u>; for <u>He</u> willed to be lifted up on the <u>Cross</u> in the flesh, to en<u>dure</u> death, and to <u>raise</u> the dead// by His <u>glo</u>rious Resur<u>rec</u>tion.

Tone 4 – Troparion of Thanksgiving

We Your unworthy <u>ser</u>vants, O Lord, grateful for Your great benefits which You have <u>showed</u> to us, glorify You, praise, bless, give thanks, sing, and magnify Your loving<u>kind</u>ness,

and with love we cry aloud unto You in humble sub<u>mis</u>siveness://O our Benefactor and Savior, glory to You!

Tone 8 - Troparion for St. Mary of Egypt

The image of <u>God</u> was <u>tru</u>ly preserved in you, O <u>Mother</u>, for you took <u>up</u> the <u>Cross</u> and <u>fol</u>lowed Christ. By so <u>doing</u>, you <u>taught</u> us to disregard the flesh for it <u>passes</u> away; but to care in<u>stead</u> for the <u>soul</u>, for it is im<u>mor</u>tal.// Therefore, your <u>spir</u>it, O <u>ho</u>ly Mother Mary, rejoices with the <u>ang</u>els.

Tone 5 - Resurrectional Kontakion

You descended into hell, O my Savior, shattering its gates as Almighty, resurrecting the dead as Creator, and destroying the sting of death. You have delivered Adam from the curse, O Lover of Man,// and we cry to You: "O Lord, save us!"

Tone 3 – Kontakion for St. Mary

Having <u>been</u> a sinful <u>wo</u>man, you became through repentance a <u>bride</u> of Christ. Having attained angelic life, you defeated demons with the <u>weap</u>on of the Cross.// Therefore, O most glorious Mary, <u>you</u> are a <u>bride</u> of the <u>King</u>dom.

Tone 3 – Theotokion of Thanksgiving

O Theotokos, the helper of <u>Chris</u>tians, having acquired your pro<u>tec</u>tion, we your servants gratefully cry a<u>loud</u> to you: Rejoice, most pure Virgin Theo<u>to</u>kos! And from all ca<u>lam</u>ities deliver us always <u>by</u> your prayers,//
O you who alone are a speedy <u>helper</u> in <u>trou</u>ble!

SCRIPTURE READINGS

Epistle: Hebrews 9.11-14 (for the 5th Sunday of Great Lent)

Brethren: Christ came as High Priest of the good things to come, with the greater and more perfect tabernacle not made with hands, that is, not of this creation. Not with the blood of goats and calves, but with His own blood He entered the Most Holy Place once for all, having obtained eternal redemption. For if the blood of bulls and goats and the ashes of a heifer, sprinkling the unclean, sanctifies for the purifying of the flesh, how much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered Himself without spot to God, cleanse your conscience from dead works to serve the living God?

Galatians 3.23-29 (for St. Mary of Egypt)

Brethren, before faith came, we were kept under guard by the law, kept for the faith which would afterward be revealed. Therefore, the law was our tutor to bring us to Christ, that we might be justified by faith. But after faith has come, we are no longer under a tutor. For you are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus. For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ. There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus. And if you are Christ's, then you are Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise.

Gospel: Mark 10.32-45 (for the 5th Sunday of Great Lent)

At that time, they were on the road, going up to Jerusalem, and Jesus was going before them; and they were amazed. And as they followed, they were afraid.

Then He took the twelve aside again and began to tell them the things that would happen to Him: "Behold, we are going up to Jerusalem, and the Son of Man will be betrayed to the chief priests and to the scribes; and they will condemn Him to death and deliver Him to the Gentiles; and they will mock Him, and scourge Him, and spit on Him, and kill Him. And the third day He will rise again."

Then James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came to Him, saying, "Teacher, we want You to do for us whatever we ask."

And He said to them, "What do you want Me to do for you?"

They said to Him, "Grant us that we may sit, one on Your right hand and the other on Your left, in Your glory."

But Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you ask. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, and be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?"

They said to Him, "We are able." So Jesus said to them, "You will indeed drink the cup that I drink, and with the baptism I am baptized with you will be baptized; but to sit on My right hand and on My left is not Mine to give, but it is for those for whom it is prepared."

And when the ten heard it, they began to be greatly displeased with James and John. But Jesus called them to Himself and said to them, "You know that those who are considered rulers over the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones exercise authority over them. Yet it shall not be so among you; but whoever desires to become great among you shall be your servant. And whoever of you desires to be first shall be slave of all. For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many."

Luke 7.36-50 (for St. Mary of Egypt)

Great multitudes followed Jesus – from Galilee, and from Decapolis, Jerusalem, Judea, and beyond the Jordan. And seeing the multitudes, He went up on a mountain, and when He was seated His disciples came to Him.

Then He opened His mouth and taught them, saying, "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth. Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be filled. Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy. Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God. Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God. Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are you when they revile and persecute you, and say all kinds of evil against you falsely for My sake. Rejoice and be exceedingly glad, for great is your reward in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

"Not My Will, but Thy Will be Done" by His Grace, our Bishop Paul

Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, Who, though He was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied Himself, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form He humbled Himself and became obedient unto death, even death on a cross (Philippians 2:5-8).

Most of us are very familiar with this reading from Philippians. It is read at most of the Marian Feasts. These words from Saint Paul express the mind we seek to acquire, the fact that "this mind" is ours in Christ, and that Christ is obedient even unto death on a cross. As I said last week: love, trust, and obedience come together in the life-creating death of our Savior on the Cross. This perfect, mature obedience is founded on our Lord's trust in His Heavenly Father; therefore, He obeys out of love for Him and for us in seeking our salvation.

The goal of obedience in life, especially family life, is this "mind" we are to acquire, which is ours in Christ. This icon of obedience brings joy into the world and brings people to their right mind. And when we are able to acquire this mind, we realize obedience is joyful, and even easy. One <u>wants to</u> obey and no longer <u>has to</u> obey.

So God accomplishes this work in us when we acquire the mind of Christ. We can't do this on our own. That is what we do during Lent. We can't dumb down our fast to the point where there is no longer any sacrifice in it. Fasting is supposed to be difficult. It is supposed to help us give up wants and hungers that dominate our lives that have nothing to do with our salvation and well-being. We pray to tell our Lord "apart from Him we can do nothing." We pray to seek communion with Him and that He would illumine the path on which we are to walk. We give alms to put others ahead of our own needs. We learn what it means to be a good steward with the things of this world by living this way.

May we, in the remaining time of this fast, move a few steps closer to acquiring this mind of our Lord.
