Holy Martyrs Proclus and Hilary of Ancyra St. Michael of Maleinus

The Holy Martyrs Proclus and Hilarion were natives of the village of Kallippi, near Ancyra, and they suffered during the time of a persecution under the emperor Trajan (98-117). St Proclus was put under arrest first. Brought before the governor Maximus, he fearlessly confessed his faith in Christ. The governor decided to compel the saint to submit himself to the emperor and offer sacrifice to the pagan gods. During his tortures, the martyr predicted to Maximus that soon he himself would be compelled to confess Christ as the true God. They forced the martyr to run after the chariot of the governor, heading towards the village Kallippi. Exhausted, St Proclus prayed that the Lord would halt the chariot. By the power of God the chariot halted, and no force could move it from the spot. The dignitary sitting in it became petrified. The martyr told him that he would remain unmoving until such time as he would sign a document with a confession of Christ. Only after this could the chariot continue on its way with the governor.

The humiliated pagan took fierce revenge on St Proclus. He commanded that Proclus be led out beyond the city, tied to a pillar and shot with arrows. The soldiers, leading St Proclus to execution, told him to give in and save his life, but the saint said that they should follow their orders.

Along the way to the place of execution, they met Hilarion, the nephew of St Proclus, who with tears embraced his uncle and also confessed himself a Christian. The soldiers seized him, and he was thrown into prison. The Martyr Proclus prayed for his tormentors and surrendered his soul to God beneath a hail of arrows.

St Hilarion was brought to trial and, with the same courage as St Proclus, confessed himself a Christian. After tortures he was sentenced to death. They tied the martyr's hands and dragged him by his feet through the city, wounded and bloody, and then they beheaded him three days after the death of his uncle, the holy Martyr Proclus. Christians buried them together in a single grave.

Tone 2 - Kontakion for St. Michael

By your <u>deeds</u> you withered the <u>arrogance</u> of the flesh; through enlightenment you gave wings to your agility of <u>spir</u>it. You were re<u>vealed</u> as a dwelling place of the <u>Trin</u>ity, Whom you now <u>clear</u>ly behold.//
Blessed Michael, un<u>ceas</u>ingly <u>pray</u> for us all!

Tone 3 - Patronal Kontakion

Today the Virgin stands in the midst <u>of</u> the Church, And with choirs of saints she invisibly prays to <u>God</u> for us. Angels and bishops <u>wor</u>ship. Apostles and prophets rejoice to<u>ge</u>ther,// Since for our <u>sake</u> she <u>prays</u> to the eternal God.

SCRIPTURE READINGS

Tone 4 – Sunday Prokeimenon (Psalm 103)

O Lord, how manifold are Your works; in wisdom have You made them all!

Epistle: Romans 10.1-10

Brethren, my heart's desire and prayer to God for Israel is that they may be saved. For I bear them witness that they have a zeal for God, but not according to knowledge. For being ignorant of God's righteousness and seeking to establish their own righteousness, they have not submitted to the righteousness of God. For Christ is the end of the law for righteousness to everyone who believes. For Moses writes about the righteousness which is of the law, "The man who does those things shall live by them."

But the righteousness of faith speaks in this way, "Do not say in your heart, 'Who will ascend into heaven?' (that is, to bring Christ down from above) or, 'Who will descend into the abyss?'" (that is, to bring Christ up from the dead). But what does it say? "The word is near you, in your mouth and in your heart" (that is, the word of faith which we preach): that if you confess with your mouth the Lord

Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation.

Gospel: Matthew 8.28 – 9.1

At that time, when Jesus had come to the other side, to the country of the Gergesenes, there met Him two demon-possessed men, coming out of the tombs, exceedingly fierce, so that no one could pass that way. And suddenly they cried out, saying, "What have we to do with You, Jesus, You Son of God? Have You come here to torment us before the time?"

Now a good way off from them there was a herd of many swine feeding. So the demons begged Him, saying, "If You cast us out, permit us to go away into the herd of swine."

And He said to them, "Go."

So when they had come out, they went into the herd of swine. And suddenly the whole herd of swine ran violently down the steep place into the sea, and perished in the water. Then those who kept them fled; and they went away into the city and told everything, including what had happened to the demon-possessed men. And behold, the whole city came out to meet Jesus. And when they saw Him, they begged Him to depart from their region. So, He got into a boat, crossed over, and came to His own city.

Programs or Relationships?

a reflection by His Eminence, our Archbishop Paul

I cannot stress how important it is that family life is the main place where Christian formation takes place. The epistle reading from Romans for last Sunday speaks to this theme:

But thanks be to God, that you who were once slaves of sin have become obedient from the heart to the standard of teaching to which you were committed, and, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms, because of your natural limitations. For just as you once yielded your members to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now yield your members to righteousness for sanctification (Romans 6:17-19).

The first part of Romans Chapter 6 focuses on the reality of baptism; we die through the cross to the Old Adam of sin leading to death, and put on the New Adam, Christ, in the power of newly resurrected life in Him. The second half of the chapter speaks to how this new life in Christ is lived by the Spirit in the body. Once we were slaves to sin, and now we are becoming slaves to righteousness. With the same zealousness we pursued a sinful life, we are now with that same zealousness called to live a righteous, Godly life.

What Baptism has given us is the freedom to choose the path we are called to follow. The problem with this path is we can't always see what lies before us on that path, as it may disappear into the fog. We can only see the next few steps ahead of us and nothing more. Therefore, it is tempting to return to the past that we have been freed from, because we know how things will go. We may be miserable, we may be unhappy, but it is predictable. With freedom comes taking risks and taking responsibility for our choices. We don't know how things will turn out. The past can make us victims, where we are not to blame. Whereas when we live in the freedom of our new life in Christ, it enables us to become responsible for our actions and to realize our true humanity.

So the process of Christian formation consists of the need to "yield our members to righteousness for sanctification." The formation of Christ in the life of parents and their children is ongoing and never ending.

I often get a lot of "how to..." questions when it comes to helping one's child to embrace Christ and the faith of the Orthodox Church. The answers are not to be found in a methodology or snap answers that have an immediate impact. Everything has to do with the quality of relationships parents nurture with their children, and the quality of relationships a family has with their parish and their parish priest. Is there an ongoing process of living an ascetical life through prayer and fasting? Is it motivated by hunger for a righteous way of living and to renounce those things that hinder the life of Christ being formed in us? This all is motivated by love, humility and repentance, and parents need to be living examples of this to their children. Baptism and Chrismation are sacraments that speak to the communal reality of the Church. We are not saved as individuals, who live in isolation from each other. We are saved as persons in communion with each other through Christ and His Holy Church.
