

St. Paul the Confessor, Archbishop of Constantinople († 350 A.D.)

Saint Paul the Confessor, Archbishop of Constantinople, was chosen to the patriarchal throne after the death of Patriarch Alexander († 340), when the Arian heresy had again flared up. Many of the Arians were present at the Council which selected the new Archbishop of Constantinople. They revolted in opposition to the choice of Saint Paul, but the Orthodox at the Council were in the majority.

The emperor Constantius, ruling over the Eastern half of the Roman Empire, was an Arian. He was not in Constantinople for the election of the Archbishop, and so it took place without his consent. Upon his return, he convened a council which illegally deposed Saint Paul, and the emperor banished him from the capital. In place of the

saint they elevated Eusebius of Nicomedia, an impious heretic. Archbishop Paul withdrew to Rome, where other Orthodox bishops were also banished by Eusebius.

Eusebius did not rule the Church of Constantinople for long. When he died, Saint Paul returned to Constantinople, and was greeted by his flock with love. But Constantius exiled the saint a second time, and so he returned to Rome. The Western emperor Constans wrote a harsh letter to his Eastern co-ruler, which he sent to Constantinople along with the holy exiled archpastor. The threats worked, and Saint Paul was reinstated upon the archepiscopal throne.

But soon the pious emperor Constans, a defender of the Orthodox, was treacherously murdered during a palace coup. They again banished Saint Paul from Constantinople and this time sent him off in exile to Armenia, to the city of Cucusus, where he endured a martyr's death. When the Archbishop was celebrating the Divine Liturgy, Arians rushed upon him by force and strangled him with his own omophorion. This occurred in the year 350.

In 381, the holy Emperor Theodosius the Great solemnly transferred the relics of Saint Paul the Confessor from Cucusus to Constantinople. In 1326, the relics of Saint Paul were transferred to Venice.

HYMNS OF THE DAY

Tone 4 - Resurrectional Troparion

When the women disciples of the Lord learned from the angel the joyous message of Your resurrection, they cast away the ancestral curse and elatedly told the apostles: "Death is overthrown! Christ our God is risen,// granting the world great mercy!"

Tone 4 – Patronal Troparion

Today the faithful celebrate the <u>feast</u> with joy, il<u>lum</u>ined by your coming, O <u>Mo</u>ther of God.

Beholding your pure image we fervently <u>cry</u> to you:

En<u>comp</u>ass us beneath the precious veil of your pro<u>tec</u>tion.

Deliver us from every form of <u>e</u>vil by en<u>treating</u> Christ, your <u>Son</u> and our God// that He may <u>save</u> our souls.

Tone 3 – Troparion for St Paul

For confessing the divine faith, among her priests the Church has shown you to be another Paul. Abel cries out to the Lord together with you, as does the righteous blood of Zachariah.//
Venerable Father, entreat Christ God to grant us His great mercy.

Tone 4 - Resurrectional Kontakion

My Savior and Re<u>deem</u>er, as God, rose from the <u>tomb</u> and delivered the <u>earth</u>-born from their chains. He has shattered the <u>gates</u> of hell, and as <u>Mas</u>ter,//
He has risen on the <u>third</u> day!

Tone 2 - Kontakion for St. Paul

<u>Paul</u>, you shone on the earth like a star of heavenly <u>splen</u>dor; now you enlighten the universal Church for which you <u>suf</u>fered, for <u>you</u> laid <u>down</u> your life,// and your blood cries out to the Lord like that of Zacha<u>ri</u>ah and <u>A</u>bel.

Tone 3 – Patronal Kontakion

Today the Virgin stands in the midst <u>of</u> the Church, And with choirs of saints she invisibly prays to <u>God</u> for us. Angels and bishops <u>wor</u>ship. Apostles and prophets rejoice to<u>ge</u>ther,// Since for our <u>sake</u> she <u>prays</u> to the eternal God.

SCRIPTURE READINGS

Tone 4 - Sunday Prokeimenon (Psalm 103)

O Lord, how manifold are Your works; in wisdom have You made them all!

Epistle: Galatians 2.16-20

Brethren: Knowing that a man is not justified by the works of the law but by faith in Jesus Christ, even we have believed in Christ Jesus, that we might be justified by faith in Christ and not by the works of the law; for by the works of the law no flesh shall be justified. But if, while we seek to be justified by Christ, we ourselves also are found sinners, is Christ therefore a minister of sin? Certainly not! For if I build again those things which I destroyed, I make myself a transgressor. For I through the law died to the law that I might live to God. I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me.

Gospel: Luke 8.41-56

At that time, there came to Jesus a man named Jairus, and he was a ruler of the synagogue. And he fell down at Jesus' feet and begged Him to come to his house, for he had an only daughter about twelve years of age, and she was dying. But as He went, the multitudes thronged Him.

Now a woman, having a flow of blood for twelve years, who had spent all her livelihood on physicians and could not be healed by any, came from behind and touched the border of His garment. And immediately her flow of blood stopped. And Jesus said, "Who touched Me?"

When all denied it, Peter and those with him said, "Master, the multitudes throng and press You, and You say, 'Who touched Me?'"

But Jesus said, "Somebody touched Me, for I perceived power going out from Me."

Now when the woman saw that she was not hidden, she came trembling; and falling down before Him, she declared to Him in the presence of all the people the reason she had touched Him and how she was healed immediately. And He said to her, "Daughter, be of good cheer; your faith has made you well. Go in peace."

While He was still speaking, someone came from the ruler of the synagogue's house, saying to him, "Your daughter is dead. Do not trouble the Teacher."

But when Jesus heard it, He answered him, saying, "Do not be afraid; only believe, and she will be made well."

When He came into the house, He permitted no one to go in except Peter, James, and John, and the father and mother of the girl. Now all wept and mourned for her; but He said, "Do not weep; she is not dead, but sleeping." And they ridiculed Him, knowing that she was dead.

But He put them all outside, took her by the hand and called, saying, "Little girl, arise."

Then her spirit returned, and she arose immediately. And He commanded that she be given something to eat. And her parents were astonished, but He charged them to tell no one what had happened.

Encyclical for IOCC Sunday, 2022

For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many. —Mark 10:45

To the Most Reverend Clergy, Venerable Monastics, and Devout Faithful of the Holy Orthodox Churches in the United States:

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On the Sunday before Thanksgiving, Orthodox faithful in the United States come together to give thanks to God for His blessings

and for the privilege of serving Christ by serving our neighbors in need. The Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the United States of America dedicates this day to the ministry of International Orthodox Christian Charities, or IOCC—the Orthodox agency that serves people in need worldwide.

For more than 30 years, IOCC has provided Orthodox Christians with a concrete way to serve people in need, near and far, as they face conflict, drought, famine, natural disasters, and economic hardship. As needs change across time, IOCC remains a reliable, effective channel for our offerings of Christian service.

Because of the faithful generosity of people like you, IOCC responds amid crisis, offering practical assistance that meets both immediate and longer-term needs. IOCC has given emergency supplies, shelter, and groceries to Ukrainians displaced by conflict: this is especially meaningful for me because in my homeland of Romania, countless families as well as the Federation Filantropia—an IOCC partner organization managed by the Romanian Orthodox Church—have opened their doors to their neighbors who are fleeing Ukraine.

Consider, as well, IOCC's offerings of emotional care, cleanup, and rebuilding after US disasters; of food for schoolchildren in Lebanon amid deep economic crisis; of groceries, animal feed, and equipment for farmers and small businesses in Greece recovering from wildfires; and of emergency food for those affected by drought and conflict in Ethiopia—in these and many more ways, IOCC fulfills human needs in the spirit of Christ's love.

Mark's Gospel reminds us that Christ, the King of all, came to serve—and that we are to follow His example. By supporting IOCC, you and I may follow the example of Christ the Servant-King. Through IOCC, we can feed, clothe, and minister to one another for His sake. This Thanksgiving, let us thank God for His blessings, and let us continue to answer the call to serve our brethren in need.

May the Lord shine His mercy upon you and your loved ones throughout the Nativity season, and may your hearts and homes be filled with His peace!
