

February 25, 2024 Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee St Tarasios of Constantinople

Saint Tarasius, Patriarch of Constantinople was of illustrious lineage. He was born and raised in Constantinople, where he received a fine education. He was rapidly promoted at the court of the emperor Constantine VI Porphyrogenitos (780-797) and Constantine's mother, the holy Empress Irene, and the saint attained the rank of senator.

During these times the Church was agitated by the turmoil of Iconoclasm. The holy Patriarch Paul, although he had formerly

supported Iconoclasm, later repented and resigned his office. He withdrew to a monastery, where he took the schema. When the holy Empress Irene and her son the emperor came to him, St Paul told them that the worthiest successor to him would be St Tarasius (who at this time was still a layman). Tarasius refused for a long time, not considering himself worthy of such high office, but he then gave in to the common accord on the condition that an Ecumenical Council be convened to address the Iconoclast heresy.

Proceeding through all the clerical ranks in a short while, St Tarasius was elevated to the patriarchal throne in the year 784. In the year 787 the Seventh Ecumenical Council was convened in the city of Nicaea, with Patriarch Tarasius presiding and 367 bishops attending. The veneration of holy icons was confirmed at the council. Those bishops who repented of their iconoclasm were again received by the Church.

St Tarasius wisely governed the Church for twenty-two years. He led a strict ascetic life. He spent all his money on God-pleasing ends, feeding and giving comfort to the aged, to the impoverished, to widows and orphans, and on Holy Pascha he set out a meal for them, and he served them himself.

The holy Patriarch fearlessly denounced the emperor Constantine Porphyrigenitos when he slandered his spouse, the empress Maria, the granddaughter of St Philaretos the Merciful, so that he could send Maria to a monastery, thus freeing him to marry his own kinswoman. St Tarasius resolutely refused to dissolve the marriage of the emperor, for which the saint fell into disgrace. Soon, however, Constantine was deposed by his own mother, the Empress Irene.

St Tarasius died in the year 806. Mourned by the Church, the saint was buried in a monastery he built on the Bosphorus. Many miracles took place at his tomb.

Tone 5 – Resurrectional Troparion

Let <u>us</u>, the faithful, praise and <u>wor</u>ship the Word, co-eternal with the Father and the <u>Spir</u>it, <u>born</u> for our salvation from the <u>Virgin</u>; for <u>He</u> willed to be lifted up on the <u>Cross</u> in the flesh, to en<u>dure</u> death, and to <u>raise</u> the dead// by His <u>glo</u>rious Resur<u>rec</u>tion.

Tone 4 – Patronal Troparion

Today the faithful celebrate the <u>feast</u> with joy, il<u>lum</u>ined by your coming, O <u>Mo</u>ther of God. Beholding your pure image we fervently <u>cry</u> to you: En<u>comp</u>ass us beneath the precious veil of your pro<u>tection</u>. Deliver us from every form of <u>e</u>vil by en<u>treating</u> Christ, your <u>Son</u> and our God// that He may <u>save</u> our souls.

Tone 5 – Resurrectional Kontakion

You descended into hell, O my Savior, shattering its gates as Almighty, resurrecting the dead as Creator, and destroying the sting of death. You have delivered Adam from the curse, O Lover of Man,// and we cry to You: "O Lord, save us!"

Tone 4 - Kontakion for the Publican and the Pharisee

Let us flee from the pride of the <u>Phar</u>isee! Let us learn humility from the <u>Pub</u>lican's tears! Let us cry to our <u>Sav</u>ior: "Have <u>mer</u>cy on us,// O only <u>mer</u>ciful One!"

Tone 3 – Patronal Kontakion

Today the Virgin stands in the midst <u>of</u> the Church, And with choirs of saints she invisibly prays to <u>God</u> for us. Angels and bishops <u>wor</u>ship. Apostles and prophets rejoice to<u>ge</u>ther,// Since for our <u>sake</u> she <u>prays</u> to the eternal God.

Tone 5 - Resurrectional Prokeimenon (Psalm 11)

You, O Lord, shall protect us and preserve us from this generation forever!

My son: You have carefully followed my doctrine, manner of life, purpose, faith, longsuffering, love, perseverance, persecutions, afflictions, which happened to me at Antioch, at Iconium, at Lystra – what persecutions I endured. But you must continue in the things which you have learned and been assured of, knowing from whom you have learned them, and that from childhood you have known the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus.

Jesus spoke this parable: "Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood and prayed thus with himself, 'God, I thank You that I am not like other men – extortioners, unjust, adulterers, or even as this tax collector. I fast twice a week; I give tithes of all that I possess.'

"And the tax collector, standing afar off, would not so much as raise his eyes to heaven, but beat his breast, saying, 'God, be merciful to me a sinner!'

"I tell you, this man went down to his house justified rather than the other; for everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted."

For Bible Study tomorrow, read Romans 5-7.

Every year, Orthodox Christian homes are blessed with the new holy water of Theophany. Make an appointment with Fr Jacob to have your home blessed. The Church teaches us to sanctify everything: dwellings, places of work, all our pursuits, and the fruits of our labor. The home blessing at Theophany represents a renewal of our lives in Christ.

Here is how to prepare for your house blessing: All who reside in the household should make every effort to be present for the blessing. We gather in the dining room or home altar. On your dining room table or family icon corner, set 1) A lit candle, 2) An icon of Christ, and 3) A small bowl. You may also prepare a list of the names of family members living and departed you wish to pray for. Also please remember to turn off any televisions or other noisy electronics. When the priest arrives everyone in the house should gather around the table/family altar and join in prayer and singing. If there are children, they usually carry the icon and a candle to lead the priest from room to room. If not, any member of the household will lead the priest. After the blessing, we gather back around the icon to commemorate family names and for the dismissal.

Reflection on the commemoration of the First and Second Finding of the Head of the Forerunner (Feb 24) by His Eminence, our Metropolitan Tikhon

Today's feast may seem quaint, confusing, or even off-putting, but in the Middle Ages, the commemoration of the finding of the Forerunner's head was a major celebration. There is a lesson for us here. The Forerunner's head was so precious and holy that it merited, not one, but two feast days (the Third Finding of the Head is celebrated on May 25). The spiritual life is an incarnate life; the saints become saints in the flesh, and even the flesh is sanctified. The holier the life, the holier the flesh—this is why we dedicate two days of the year to celebrating the decapitated head of the "greatest born of woman." In our attempt to lead a spiritual life, a faithful life in Christ, are we making a genuine effort to sanctify our flesh unto God? Or do we let the flesh follow after its own base appetites? Through the prayers of the Forerunner, may we bridle the passions of the flesh and, by ascetic effort, fashion our bodies into more fitting temples of the Holy Trinity.
