# April 28, 2024 The Feast of Palms

Palm Sunday is the celebration of the triumphant entrance of Christ into the royal city of Jerusalem. He rode on a colt for which He Himself had sent, and He permitted the people to hail Him publicly as a king. A large crowd met Him in a manner befitting royalty, waving palm branches and placing their garments in His path. They greeted Him with these words: "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, even the King of Israel! (John 12:13).

This day together with the raising of Lazarus are signs pointing beyond themselves to the mighty deeds and events which consummate Christ's earthly ministry. The time of fulfillment was at hand. Christ's raising of Lazarus points to the destruction of death and the joy of resurrection which will be accessible to all through His own death and resurrection. His entrance into Jerusalem is a fulfillment of the messianic prophecies about the king who will enter his holy city to establish a final kingdom. "Behold, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on an ass, and on a colt, the foal of an ass" (Zech 9:9).

Finally, the events of these triumphant two days are but the passage to Holy Week: the "hour" of suffering and death for which Christ came. Thus, the triumph in a earthly sense is extremely shortlived. Jesus enters openly into the midst of His enemies, publicly saying and doing those things which mostly enrage them. The people themselves will soon reject Him. They misread His brief earthly triumph as a sign of something else: His emergence as a political messiah who will lead them to the glories of an earthly kingdom.

On Palm Sunday palm and willow branches are blessed in the Church. We take them and raise them up to greet the King and Ruler of our life: Jesus Christ. We take them to reaffirm our baptismal pledges. As the One who raised Lazarus and entered Jerusalem to go to His voluntary Passion stands in our midst, we are faced with the same question addressed to us at baptism: "Do you accept Christ?" We give our answer by daring to take the branch and raise it up: "I accept Him as King and God!"

Thus, on the eve of Christ's Passion, in the celebration of the joyful cycle of the triumphant days of Lazarus Saturday and Palm Sunday, we reunite ourselves to Christ, affirm His Lordship over the totality of our life, and express our readiness to follow Him to His Kingdom.

## HYMNS OF THE DAY

#### **First Antiphon**

I <u>love</u> the Lord because <u>He</u> has heard the <u>voice</u> of my suppli<u>ca</u>tion.

*Refrain:* Through the prayers of the Theotokos, O Savior, save us!

Be<u>cause</u> He inclined His <u>ear</u> to me; <u>there</u>fore I will call on Him as <u>long</u> as I live.

The <u>snares</u> of death en<u>com</u>passed me; the <u>pangs</u> of hell laid <u>hold</u> on me.

I <u>suf</u>fered distress and <u>ang</u>uish, so I <u>called</u> on the <u>Name</u> of the Lord. I will <u>walk</u> in the <u>pre</u>sence of the Lord in the <u>land</u> of the <u>liv</u>ing.

Glory to the <u>Fa</u>ther and to the Son and to the Holy <u>Spi</u>rit, now and <u>ev</u>er and unto ages of <u>ag</u>es. Amen.

## Second Antiphon

I <u>kept</u> my faith, even <u>when</u> I said, "<u>I</u> am greatly af<u>flic</u>ted."

*Refrain:* O Son of God, seated the colt of an ass, save us who sing to You: "Alleluia!"

<u>What</u> shall I <u>ren</u>der to the Lord for <u>all</u> the things He has <u>giv</u>en me?

I will re<u>ceive</u> the cup of sal<u>va</u>tion and <u>call</u> on the <u>Name</u> of the Lord.

I will <u>pay</u> my <u>vows</u> to the Lord in the <u>pre</u>sence of all His <u>peo</u>ple.

And we continue with "Only-Begotten Son" as usual.

#### Third Antiphon

**Cantor:** O give thanks to the Lord, for He is good; for His mercy endures forever! Let the house of Israel say that He is good, for His mercy endures forever!

Choir: Tone 1 – Troparion of the Feast By <u>rais</u>ing Lazarus from the dead before Your <u>Pas</u>sion, You confirmed the universal resurrection, O <u>Christ</u> God. Like the <u>child</u>ren with the palms of <u>vic</u>tory, we cry out to You, O <u>Van</u>quisher of Death: "Ho<u>san</u>na in the <u>high</u>est!// Blessed is He that comes in the <u>Name</u> of the Lord."

**Cantor:** Let the house of Aaron say that He is good, for His mercy endures forever! Let those who fear the Lord say that He is good, for His mercy endures forever!

*The clergy exit the altar and join those already lined up for the Procession of Palms. The choir and people follow, repeating the Troparion of the Feast as we process around the Church building. As we return into the temple, the clergy make the Entrance:* 

**Deacon:** Wisdom! Let us stand upright! Blessed is He that comes in the Name of the Lord. We bless you from the house of the Lord. God is the Lord and He has revealed Himself to us!

We sing the Troparion of the Feast again, then:

#### Tone 4 – Another Troparion for the Feast

When we were buried with You in baptism, O <u>Christ</u> God, we were made <u>wor</u>thy of eternal life by Your Resur<u>rec</u>tion. Now we <u>praise</u> You and sing:

"Ho<u>san</u>na in the <u>high</u>est!// Blessed is He that comes in the <u>Name</u> of the Lord!"

#### Tone 6 – Kontakion of the Feast

Sitting on Your throne in <u>Heav</u>en, carried on a foal on earth, O <u>Christ</u> God, accept the praise of angels and the songs of <u>child</u>ren who sing:// "Blessed is <u>He</u> Who comes to recall <u>Ad</u>am!"

### SCRIPTURE READINGS

#### Tone 4 – Festal Prokeimenon (Psalm 117)

Blessed is He that comes in the Name of the Lord! God is the Lord and has revealed Himself to us!

#### **Epistle: Philippians 4:4-9**

Brethren: Rejoice in the Lord always. Again, I will say, rejoice! Let your gentleness be known to all men. The Lord is at hand. Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God; and the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus.

Finally, brethren, whatever things are true, whatever things are noble, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any virtue and if there is anything praiseworthy – meditate on these things. The things which you learned and received and heard and saw in me, these do, and the God of peace will be with you.

#### Gospel: John 12.1-18

Six days before the Pascha, Jesus came to Bethany, where Lazarus was who had been dead, whom He had raised from the dead. There they made Him a supper; and Martha served, but Lazarus was one of those who sat at the table with Him. Then Mary took a pound of very costly oil of spikenard, anointed the feet of Jesus, and wiped His feet with her hair. And the house was filled with the fragrance of the oil.

But one of His disciples, Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, who would betray Him, said, "Why was this fragrant oil not sold for three hundred denarii and given to the poor?"

This he said, not that he cared for the poor, but because he was a thief, and had the money box; and he used to take what was put in it. But Jesus said, "Let her alone; she has kept this for the day of My burial. For the poor you have with you always, but Me you do not have always."

Now a great many of the Jews knew that He was there; and they came, not for Jesus' sake only, but that they might also see Lazarus, whom He had raised from the dead. But the chief priests plotted to put Lazarus to death also, because on account of him many of the Jews went away and believed in Jesus.

The next day a great multitude that had come to the feast, when they heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem, took branches of palm trees and went out to meet Him, and cried out: "Hosanna! 'Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!' The King of Israel!"

Then Jesus, when He had found a young donkey, sat on it; as it is written: "Fear not, daughter of Zion; behold, your King is coming, sitting on a donkey's colt." His disciples did not understand these things at first; but when Jesus was glorified, then they remembered that these things were written about Him and that they had done these things to Him.

Therefore, the people who were with Him when He called Lazarus out of his tomb and raised him from the dead bore witness. For this reason the people also met Him, because they heard that He had done this sign.
